District

- Kearsley partnered with the University of Michigan to offer supplemental health services to school-age students at a health center inside Kearsley High School.
- A perfect audit of district finances was once again recorded by a third party accounting firm.
- Staff and students raised \$11,600 for **Kearsley's Christmas Charities**.
- All buildings are equipped with high levels of technology including interactive Smart Boards, document cameras, desk-top and lap-top computers, iPads and tablets.

Class of 2017

- Seniors were offered more than \$1.7 million in scholarships.

- Offers classes for infants and toddlers along with preschool options (for 3-5 year olds) in Child Development,

- Great Start to Readiness Program (GSRP) is offered to the district's eligible 4-year-olds.
